A Welcome To You

We are delighted that you are considering the role of our ordained minister. We hope this profile will give you a flavour of us as a church family, our needs, our hopes for the future and what the post has to offer.

The Parish of East Dean with Friston is combined with that of St Andrew's, Jevington to form the United Benefice of East Dean with Friston and Jevington.

The Churches of **E**ast **D**ean **F**riston and **J**evington are not the buildings but the people, who strive to be "**E**very **D**ay **F**ollowing **J**esus".

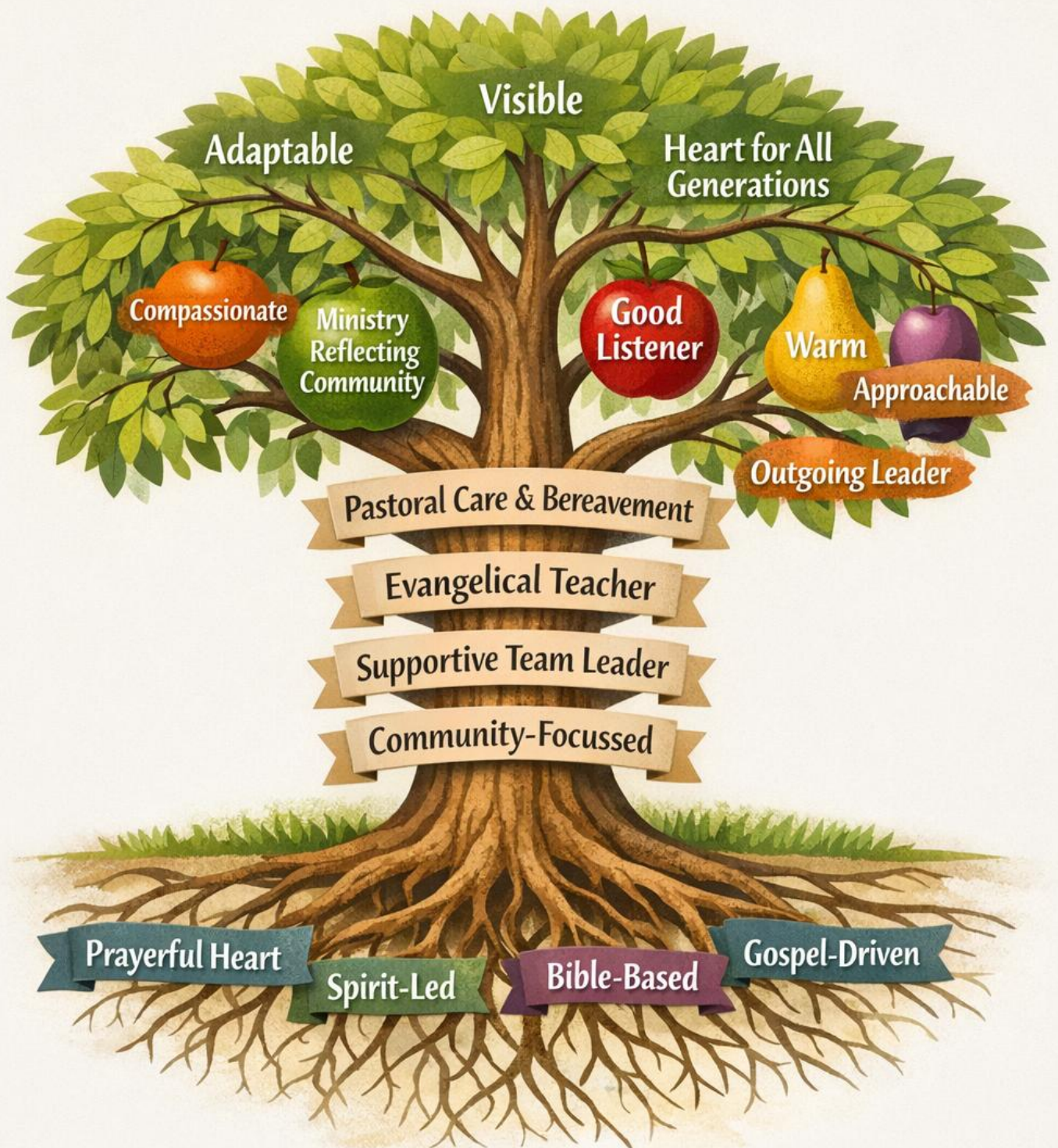
We are a Benefice which seeks to be Jesus Centred, Bible Based; Mission Minded and Spirit Filled. We are seeking a minister who is a Bible based Evangelical, **teaching sound doctrine** alongside strong pastoral skills. We seek to demonstrate through our words and actions that we are committed to everyone in our Community, believing that each individual is loved by God and made in His image.

Jesus Christ is "the main thing". Our mission is to follow Christ's great commandment, Matthew 28 "**.....go and make disciples of all nations**" and for us in particular in East Dean, Friston and Jevington.

We are prayerfully seeking: -

- An able preacher and teacher of the Gospel, who believes the Good News that Jesus died in place for our sins upon the cross. Someone who believes in the authority of the Bible- whose ministry, led by the Holy Spirit, will be Bible Based, Gospel driven and expounding the Scriptures in their preaching.
- An understanding, supportive, approachable and proactive leader who can guide the church family with a servant's heart, encouraging and developing individual and collective ministry. They would help us to be open to development and new directions, enabling us to be courageous, so that together the body of Christ may be built up.
- A prayerful person committed to sharing the Gospel who enjoys reaching out to and engaging with the wider community, maintaining a visible profile and a heart for all generations. They will listen, be understanding and be responsive so that their ministry will reflect the needs and balance of the whole community.
- A leader whose pastoral skills combine compassion, kindness, joy, warmth and love for others. A person-centred, good listener who can inspire us to be the same. They will support diversity and vulnerability in individuals, making all feel welcome, included, valued and safe.

- A leader who has a collaborative approach to decision-making, and is prepared to listen to the opinion of others. They will also be committed to building a strong team and encouraging 'every member ministry'. They will be skilful in uniting the distinct church families and PCCs under one church vision, ensuring the smaller churches feel equally valued alongside the larger one. They will be happy moving between the three villages, each with their own characteristics and needs.



Our Benefice Mission Action Plan demonstrates how we wish to further grow the Gospel. We also recognise that the long-term absence of a Minister following an injury (since January 2025) has meant that we have much now to do in this area. The MAP is summarised with the following graphic:

Section 2: Parish Profile of East Dean with Friston

The Parish is located in the South Downs National Park, set in a coastal area of outstanding natural beauty. Farming on the Downs comprises mainly sheep and cattle.

The Parish boundary encompasses in part the cliffs at Beachy Head and Birling Gap, both popular tourist areas, but also sadly notorious for the number of suicides. The Parish actively supports the work of The Beachy Head Chaplaincy- a Christian Crisis Intervention charity committed to saving lives at Beachy Head.

East Dean and Friston, originally two villages, now form a rural continuum; East Dean village, including the churches, is in a conservation area. Friston pond is a scheduled ancient monument, located adjacent to Friston Church. Also in the parish are the separate hamlets of Birling Gap and Crowlink.

The main A259 runs through the village dividing the old and newer parts. The neighbouring towns of Eastbourne – 4.3 miles, and Seaford- 5.3 miles, can be easily reached by public transport, with an excellent bus service, and good ongoing links to London.

According to the 2021 census the total population of the united parish is 2082; 50% of the population is aged over 65. 121 people are aged between 0 and 17 years, with 44 aged 0-9 years. There are approx. 770 households.

The village community is extremely friendly and supportive, but there is a need for a better and structured approach to pastoral visiting and welcoming newcomers to both the churches and village.

There is a newsagent, hairdresser, butcher, delicatessen and a general store. There is also a Thai restaurant, the Tiger Inn and a cafe. There is a weekly Farmers Market.

A modern Village Hall was opened in 2000. This has been a great benefit to the thriving social life of the village. A list of activities in the parish is given separately. The Church makes use of the Village Hall for various events e.g., Harvest Suppers, and various lunches. A regular newssheet of activities in the Hall is produced by the Trustees.

Good schools are easily accessible in both Eastbourne and Seaford.

THE CHURCH BUILDINGS OF EAST DEAN AND FRISTON

There are two 11th Century Grade 1 Listed parish churches of equal status: St Simon and St Jude in East Dean and St Mary the Virgin in Friston. There is one Rectory. There are no other religious buildings of any faith in the parish, nor are there any schools.

Quinquennial Reports on both buildings were undertaken in 2024 and all recommended works have been undertaken. Both buildings are in good order internally and externally, as are the Churchyards. Friston Church will require redecoration in the medium term.

At East Dean Church a programme of "Building for the Future" commenced in 2012 with the objective of making the church more accessible. A new extension was added – "The Cornerstone Room" to provide a creche, kitchen and toilet facilities. Some pews were removed to increase social and flexible space, and glazed doors to enhance our welcome, as well as enhanced Audio-Visual capabilities.

At Friston church a loop audio system was installed for the benefit of the hard of hearing in 2012. In June 2022 an environmentally friendly Nat Sol toilet facility, funded entirely by voluntary donations of the church family was constructed in the church grounds . These improvements were implemented for the comfort and benefit of church users.

There are 118 names on the Electoral Roll at East Dean and Friston, of which 31 are not resident in the parish.

RECTORY

The Rectory, which also serves Jevington Church, is situated about 300 yards from East Dean Church and in good condition, both structurally and decoratively. It comprises a lounge, dining room, recently refurbished kitchen, laundry room, and incumbent's study. There is a ground floor ensuite bedroom, with disability access. Upstairs there are 5 bedrooms, separate upstairs toilet, two bathrooms, one shower room and toilet en suite. Outside there are two storage sheds in the attractive garden and the PCC takes care of the grass cutting.

WORSHIP

The present services and average numbers attending are shown below. All regular services at Friston follow the Book of Common Prayer, with organ-led hymns. At East Dean, a booklet based on Common Worship is the basis for each service, with a music group leading sung worship.

We have a very good relationship with the Grange Care Home, next door to East Dean Church, and offer a mid-week Communion service, and we visit them regularly, as well as some of the residents joining our services.

"Special" services are held throughout the year, e.g. Sea Sunday [with Coastguards, RNLI and Beachy Head Chaplains]; Service of Light, All Souls; previously Songs of Praise [at Birling Gap]; as well as more "usual" Harvest Festival; Remembrance Sunday, Easter and Christmas Carol services.

CHURCH ACTIVITIES

Safeguarding

The care of children and vulnerable adults is our top priority. All volunteers have received appropriate certificated Safeguarding training and been subject to the appropriate checks.

Lighthouse Club

Lighthouse Club is for children 3-14 years old and meets in the Cornerstone Room of East Dean Church. We have a committed team of 6 volunteers leading a programme of Bible teaching, games, craft and prayer. The team also organise seasonal events throughout the year including a well-attended community Light Party in October, a stall at the Summer Fete, and the Nativity service. Numbers of children attending regular Sunday services have sadly dwindled over the past year or so, and we would look to our new incumbent to encourage growth in this area.

Holiday Club

Holiday Club is run by the Lighthouse Club team over three mornings during the Easter school holidays, then incorporating elements of the club into the following Sunday's service at East Dean. Approx. 20 children come along to the club and enjoy upfront Bible teaching, music, games, craft and refreshments, learning about Jesus and why we celebrate Easter.



Carers

A monthly coffee morning for those who are the main carer for a very close loved one suffering from debilitating illness in the parish.

Coffee and Company

On the 1st Friday of every month held in East Dean Church as an open time of friendship and fellowship for villagers and visitors, many of whom are not regular "churchgoers".

Bereavement

We have started up a monthly lunch for those who have recently lost a much-loved partner in the community.

Pastoral Care Team

A small team committed to visiting those in need. We would look to our new incumbent to particularly focus on this area.

The Parish Magazine

Under the auspices of the PCC, the Parish Magazine is edited and delivered, by a dedicated editor and team, free to every house in the parish and by post to several outside the parish. It is financed by voluntary contributions and advertisements and is very well received.

Stewardship

80% of our giving comes from regular covenanted inflation linked giving through The Parish Giving Scheme. The Parish historically has paid 100% of the requested Diocesan Parish Contribution; post Covid this has currently fallen to 85%. Section 3: Parish Profile of Jevington



We are a small, faithful and friendly congregation in a beautiful rural setting. Our church family is loyal and deeply rooted in the history and geography of our ancient church: a place where Christians have come to worship for over 1000 years. We describe ourselves as a traditional church and one who offers a warm and hospitable atmosphere and welcomes all. It is very important to us that we are friendly, inclusive and welcoming to all visitors and members of our community.

We seek a new minister who is looking for an opportunity to help us grow our church in maturity and number, strengthen our faith and help us in our walk with Jesus Christ, and to extend our presence in the local community; who will enjoy being a visible, approachable figure and will reach out and welcome all.

Our Vision for St. Andrew's

We want to:

- See St. Andrew's and its mission flourish.
- Put St. Andrew's back into the heart of the spiritual and community life of the parish.
- Strengthen the faith of our church family through regular prayer, worship, study and reflection.
- Reach parts of the community that are not currently reflected in our membership or worship.
- Demonstrate through our words and actions that we are committed to the value of all people who share our faith.
- Make our church building more accessible to all so it can contribute fully to our mission. This includes the need for new toilet facilities and revisiting how we might offer more and easier parking.

Our Parish

- The ecclesiastical parish falls within the civil parish of Willington and Jevington and is set within the conservation area of the South Downs National Park, a designated area of outstanding natural beauty.
- St Andrew's, Jevington was a parish in its own right until 1978 when the Diocese merged it with SS Simon & Jude, East Dean and St Mary the Virgin, Friston to make the united benefice and the rectory moved to East Dean.
- St Andrew's has still retained a separate Parochial Church Council.
- St Andrew's church is the only religious building of any faith in the ecclesiastical parish of Jevington. The Rectory for the Benefice is situated at East Dean, approximately three miles from Jevington.
- The parish of Jevington comprises the village of Jevington, the small hamlet of Filching and part of the more populated area of Wannock. There are 328 properties in the ecclesiastical parish including: 3 Working Farms, 2 Racing Stables, 1 Public House and 2 Village Halls.
- The population of the parish numbers approximately 470. There are all age ranges, although the majority is aged forty years and above with a large proportion of pensioners. There is no school in the ecclesiastical parish and children attend Willington State Primary and Secondary schools in the civil parish.
- Jevington has developed its own village hall in the old school room which is well used for village social activities though the only access is up steep steps from the road. There are plans to develop the area to create a road round the back of the hall with parking facilities to make it more accessible. Wannock has a large village hall at the other end of the parish with good facilities. It is well used by local clubs and exercise groups.
- Jevington is very popular with cyclists and walkers who are exploring the South Downs and enjoying the beauty of its landscapes. St. Andrew's is often used and much appreciated as a peaceful resting place and watering stop.



Our Church Building

Our church building:

- Is ancient and beautiful and set in the stunning landscape of the South Downs.
- Is one of the oldest churches in the South Downs and a place of Christian worship and prayer for over 1000 years.
- Is a Grade 1 listed building dating from AD 900.
- Is well-kept and maintained. There is ongoing review of works required and a regular programme of maintenance for both inside and outside the building.
- Has benefited significantly in the last 20 years from:
 - Major restoration work to the Saxon tower and south porch in 2005, following two years of energetic fund-raising by the church community.
 - Repairs in 2008 to the roof, guttering and downpipes over the chancel, and to restore the stonework and stained glass in some of the main windows.
 - Improvements to the heating in 2018.
 - Addition of a hearing loop facility.
- Is set in a beautiful, peaceful churchyard. The older part is being allowed to grow naturally to create an area of biodiversity. The lower part is still open for burials and was extended in 2009 to add additional burial spaces.
- Has a beautiful Victorian pipe organ which was completely restored and conserved in 2001-02.
- Has two bells and medieval bell frame in the tower which were fully restored in 2010.
- Will need further work on the fabric after the next Quinquennial Inspection report which is due in 2027.
- Is much cherished by the church family, local residents and visitors.

Our Church Life

Recent Challenges

The last 18 months has presented St. Andrew's with some challenges as we have sought, along with the other two churches in the benefice, to continue with our weekly Sunday service, during a time of long-term sickness absence and illness amongst our clergy team. With the support of a compassionate and caring group of retired clergy and lay ministers this has been possible and we have been thankful for it. Alongside this, however, the lack of continuity and an absence of visible leadership have left the church family feeling unsupported at times. This has been felt more strongly by some than others but certainly prevented new members being offered the opportunity to develop a spiritually nurturing relationship with a single member of the church leadership. These challenges have also offered opportunity, and a strong bond of mutual respect and collaboration has been established between the three churches. This provides a great foundation for a new minister to build upon.

Our Worship

We are Bible based and Gospel focused.

We describe ourselves as traditional but with a flexibility that reflects our awareness that we need to cater for a range of approaches to both worship and understanding of God. In this way we believe we can do the work of Jesus with care for others, love and community as our central belief.

- The current number on the 2026 Electoral Roll for St Andrew's is 34, of which 20 are non-resident in the parish.
- A regular service every Sunday. The service starts at 11.15am and there is a pattern of three Family Services, with a service of Holy Communion on the 3rd Sunday each month.
- The benefice has produced a small service book based on the Church of England Common Worship which allows flexibility in the style of some of our services and accommodating to visiting clergy.
- Regular attendance at our weekly services averages 15-18 in the congregation. We have seen some growth in numbers in the last twelve months and have been pleased to welcome some younger adult members to the congregation.
- Services at Easter, Harvest, Remembrance and Christmas attract larger attendance and particularly from local residents who are not regular attendees.
- At Christmas Eve 2025 Communion service there were 16 communicants. We no longer have a Christmas Day service at St Andrew's. The annual candle-light Service of Nine Lessons and Carols attracts a congregation from within and outside the parish which swells the attendance to 50-60.
- In 2026 the Easter Day service welcomed 29 people, including two children, and 24 took Communion.
- In 2025 we held our first patronal service for St. Andrew's in many years. We hope to make this an annual service of thanksgiving.
- A new initiative in the last 12 months has been a united benefice service; all three churches across the benefice come together when there is a fifth Sunday in the month for joint worship and fellowship. Each church takes it in turn to host the service.
- We enjoy hymns and music in our services. Unfortunately, we do not have a regular organist but rely on recorded music.

Our Fellowship and Outreach

- Fellowship and warm hospitality are very important to us. We enjoy a period of fellowship after each service over refreshments.
- Simple Lent and Harvest lunches are held each year in the church. They are well attended by both regular churchgoers and visitors. We take donations for a local charity, and in recent times have supported the Spinnaker Education Trust, JPK Project and the Beachy Head Chaplaincy. We also support Family Support Work and the Eastbourne Food Bank during the year, with collections of food, gifts and toys.
- For many years we have held 'Teas in The Tower' – a regular monthly event during the summer which is popular with local residents and visitors. This event forms part of our outreach to travellers on the South Downs Way, which runs alongside the churchyard. We invite all to come and enjoy the beauty of our church building, to meet members of the church family and to share homemade refreshments. It is also an important fundraising event as we receive generous donations.

- St Andrew's is a welcoming church, open every day for walkers and visitors – of which there are many. From the entries in the visitors' book it is obviously well loved, especially by those who have family connections with the church or are interested in its history.
- We produce a quarterly church and community magazine called 'Jevington Journal' which includes details of our church activities and local community events. It is financed by advertising and is distributed free to every household in Jevington, Filching and part of Wannock.
- In 2026 we put up a small prayer tree in the church to encourage our many visitors in their reflections and prayers. Those named on the tree are included in our service prayer time each month.
- From 2015 to 2017 the benefice was blessed to have the services of Rev Kip' Chelashaw. His lifelong mission was to return to his native Kenya to establish a new church plant in a slum area of Nairobi, his hometown. As a benefice we pledged to support him financially and this we have continued to do over the last nine years by holding a gift day each year.



Our People

- St. Andrew's is organised and run by a small, hardworking team.
- We have two churchwardens.
- Many duties are delegated to specific individuals who have taken on responsibility for managing different routines and tasks.
- The church family are kept informed via WhatsApp of any changes to tasks or help needed. This approach has brought the church family closer together and is working well.
- Our PCC meet 5-6 times a year. We have a small membership who take their responsibilities very seriously. It currently comprises the incumbent, a member of the benefice clergy team, two churchwardens and 3 elected members of the laity.

Our Financial Position

- With such a small number on the electoral roll and fewer people donating to the church cash collection our finances have always been challenging. The total income for 2025 was £28,086 and expenditure for the year was £21,440, but voluntary income from regular donors was only £8,969, which was a reduction of 21% on the previous year after several regular donors passed away or moved from the parish.
- An unrestricted legacy of £10,000 in 2025 enabled us to cover our regular payments and meet the reduced sum pledged to the Diocese.
- We had £39,221 in unrestricted reserves at the start of 2026, and without vigorous fundraising this year we will need to draw from them during the year to balance the books.
- We had negotiated a reduced amount for our Parish Ministry Costs several years ago and are grateful that the Diocese have accepted the same amount as last year of £6,000 for 2026 plus the 3% increase requested from all parishes, which only covers 40% of what our share of the benefice PMC should be.
- We also hold £36,443 in restricted and endowment funds which can be used only for repairing the fabric of the church. As St Andrew's is expecting its next Quinquennial Inspection report in 2027 these funds will be needed for any urgent repairs to the church.

Going Forward

Like many small, rural churches we face many challenges. But these also bring new opportunities for ministry to a minister who wishes to help us grow by visible and approachable leadership, reaching out to our community and reconnecting in new ways with our local residents and visitors.

Our Challenges

- A small, elderly congregation
- Boundless goodwill, but a limited capacity and resources both for church-based tasks and for outreach (for example, home groups)
- An old church building that requires some modern facilities to support growth (including toilet facilities)
- A lack of parking close to the church and narrow access which deters people from wanting to come to the church (and draws them to other, more easily accessible local churches).
- Local residents who cherish the church building and its history, support fundraising and maintenance but are not regular attenders.
- A small giving base that requires creative, careful management.
- A lack of financial resilience.
- The juggling act for a minister of dividing Sundays and weekdays across multiple communities.

Our Opportunities

- To bring untapped mission and new ideas for growth and community ministry to St. Andrew's.
- To use our many visitors as a new missional bridge.
- To enjoy the support of a hard-working and friendly team, committed to protecting the future of St. Andrew's.
